ASQ-TRAK and Child Health Checks

- > ASQ-TRAK
 - Developmental screening tool for observing and monitoring the developmental progress of Australian Aboriginal children at 2 months, 6 months, 12 months, 18 months, 24 months, 36 months and 48 months of age
 - Highlights a child's strengths as well as catches delays early
- Child Health Checks (Healthy Under 5 Kids Check)
 - Standardised practice of comprehensive well-child health assessments, in a format that can be utilised by all staff

Drivers for change


- Level of need in Alice Springs and long term consequences
- Several years of advocacy for early childhood programs
- Evidence-base for investment in early childhood is strong and growing
- Increased political recognition of the importance of early childhood development increased screening
- NDIS.

Process for implementation

- Employment of child heath nurses to specifically undertake screening
- Education and training
- Working on best scheduling regime
- Recalls, proactive engagement with families, ALOs and family support workers, Connected Beginnings, Early Childhood Learning Centre.


Number of health checks claimed in month






Number of ASQ-TRAKs Completed
