



Aboriginal groups in the Northern Territory have previously defined Food security as when the food of our ancestors is protected and always there for us and our children. It is also when we can easily access and afford the right non-traditional food for a collective healthy and active life. When we are food secure, we can provide, share and fulfil our responsibilities, we can choose good food knowing how to make choices and how to prepare and use it.






Community controlled services means it is done how people want it run and what people need... Government always come in and takes over a program and stuffs it up. They don't run it right.


195 recommendations




46% of the submissions reviewed contained recommendations relating to Governance


Governance-related recommendations called for:

- 1. More and stronger community control (e.g. more stores community owned, and more legitimate decision making power)
- 2. Collective action to reform systems
 that are not supporting community control
 (e.g. Resolving the royalty vs food pricing debates)
- 3. Better governance support to strengthen community decision making (e.g. more funding for external governance support)


Aboriginal employment rates
